Confidence-Building Measures in East Asia: A Twin Approach

1. Introduction

Today, a couple of serious territorial disputes are going on in East Asia regarding Takeshima/Dokdo Islets¹ between South Korea and Japan, Senkaku/Diaoyu Islands² among China, Taiwan and Japan, and Socotra/Suyan Rock (Ieodo) between China and South Korea. There are also disputes related to the Exclusive Economic Zones ("EEZs") and the continental shelf in the East China Sea among China, Japan and Korea.³

As the political tension began escalating in East Asia, a few military collisions occurred between China and Japan⁴ when a ship-based helicopter from the Chinese training fleet in the East China Sea came very closely (approximately 90m horizontally and approximately 30m vertically) to a Japan Maritime Self-Defense
