Then, he continued to study international law at Leiden University for LL.M. and completed his Ph.D. in that field under the supervision of Professor Peter Malanczuk at Erasmus University Rotterdam, The Netherlands. Since coming back home, he has taught international law at Seoul National University, Yonsei University, Ewha Woman’s University and Hankuk University of Foreign Studies. Dr. Lee, an analyst of international law based on international relations, is an expert of international organization, international dispute settlement, and inter-Korean relations. He graduated in economics with academic distinction from the University of California at Berkeley and studied law at the University of Cambridge. Author of *Reclaiming Development in the World Trading System* (Cambridge University Press, 2009), *Safeguard Measures in World Trade: The Legal Analysis* (Edward Elgar, 2014), and *Law and Development Perspective on International Trade Law* (Cambridge University Press, 2011), Professor Lee has over sixty scholarly publications in the areas of international trade law and economic development, comparative law, and international commercial arbitration. His recent work has been focused on the impact that domestic and international legal systems, including the legal framework for international trade, has on economic development. He has also developed the concept of microtrade, a new system of international trade designed to alleviate populations of the least-developed countries of extreme poverty. He has recently co-authored and edited a treatise on microtrade, *Microtrade: A New System of International Trading System with Volunteerism towards Poverty Elimination* (Routledge, 2013).
